Series Overview

The book of Acts of the Apostles tells the story of how the risen Christ builds His Church through the Holy Spirit. What begins in Jerusalem with a small group of disciples quickly spreads across cities, cultures, and generations.

This Easter season, we follow that movement.

From bold witness in the face of opposition...
to hearts cut open by the Word...
to a people gathered around Word and Sacrament...
to faithfulness in suffering...
to the Gospel reaching new nations...

This is not just the story of the early Church. It is the story of Christ at work in every age. It is the story that reached Mendon 125 years ago, when St. Mark was founded to proclaim the Gospel in this community. And it is still our story today.

As we give thanks for the past, we also look forward in faith—because the same risen Christ who built His Church in Jerusalem is still building His Church here in Mendon.

The story isn’t finished yet.

Series Visual Concept

The series visual captures the movement of the Gospel across time.

On the left is Jerusalem—the place where the Church began. Warm tones and the figure of proclamation reflect the fire of the Holy Spirit and the bold witness of the apostles.

On the right is St. Mark Lutheran Church in Mendon. Cooler tones place us in the present, showing that the same Gospel is still being proclaimed today.

At the center stands the title: **“From Jerusalem to Mendon.”** It serves as a visual bridge, connecting past and present in one continuous story.

Light moves across the image, symbolizing the Gospel carried by the Holy Spirit from generation to generation.

Th	Acts 7:54–56	Fix your eyes on Christ, especially in difficult moments.
F	Acts 7:59–60	Pray for someone who has wronged you.
S	Romans 8:18	Trust that present suffering cannot compare to future glory.

Week 1 - “A Church That Cannot Be Silenced”

Text of the Week: Acts 5:29–42

Theme: The risen Christ gives His Church courage to speak.

Summary:

The apostles refuse to remain silent about Jesus, even under pressure. Their courage comes not from themselves, but from the risen Christ. The Gospel continues to be proclaimed because Christ is alive.

Key Image: A flame that cannot be extinguished.

Application: Speak the name of Jesus with courage, trusting that He is at work.

Day	Scripture	Challenge/Reflection
M	Acts 4:18–20	Where do you feel pressure to stay silent about your faith? Ask God for courage to speak.
T	Acts 5:27–29	What does it mean in your life to “obey God rather than men”?
W	Matthew 10:26–33	Pray for boldness to acknowledge Christ in your daily conversations.
Th	Romans 1:16–17	Say aloud: “I am not ashamed of the Gospel.” Reflect on why this is true.
F	2 Timothy 1:7–8	Ask God to replace fear with power, love, and self-control.
S	Acts 5:40–42	Thank God that the Gospel continues—even through hardship.

Week 2 - “How the Church Begins”

Text of the Week: Acts 2:36–41

Theme: The Church begins through repentance and baptism.

Summary:

Peter’s preaching cuts hearts open, and the Spirit brings people to repentance. Through baptism, forgiveness is given and the Church is formed. This is how every Christian life begins.

Key Image: Water pouring over stone, bringing life.

Application: Return daily to repentance and rejoice in your baptism.

Day	Scripture	Challenge/Reflection
M	Acts 2:36–37	Where is God’s Word confronting your heart today?
T	Psalms 51:1–12	Pray a prayer of repentance, asking God for a clean heart.
W	Acts 2:38–39	Remember your baptism—what does it mean for you today?
Th	Romans 6:3–5	Live today as one united with Christ in His death and resurrection.
F	1 John 1:8–9	Confess your sins and trust fully in God’s forgiveness.
S	Titus 3:4–7	Thank God that salvation is His work, not yours.

Week 3 - “The Life of the Church”

Text of the Week: Acts 2:42–47

Theme: The Spirit forms a community around Word, Sacrament, fellowship, and prayer.

Summary:

The early Church is devoted to the means of grace and life together. This simple rhythm sustains the Church in every generation.

Key Image: A table set for a shared meal.

Application: Remain rooted in Word, Sacrament, and community.

Day	Scripture	Challenge/Reflection
M	Acts 2:42	Which of these—Word, fellowship, Sacrament, prayer—needs strengthening in your life?
T	2 Timothy 3:14–17	Set aside time today to dwell intentionally in God’s Word.
W	Hebrews 10:24–25	Reach out to encourage someone in your church community.
Th	1 Corinthians 10:16–17	Reflect on the unity we share in the Lord’s Supper.
F	Philippians 4:6–7	Turn one worry today into a prayer.
S	Psalms 133	Thank God for the gift of life together in the Church.
